We know the issues that arise and see the policies and procedures that may not be best serving our students. So why not do something about these issues? This session is designed to empower you to create change when change is needed. In this session, you will be presented with a step-by-step process on how to effectively lead change on your campus focusing specifically on successful changes the presenter has implemented on their own campus.

Rea Kirk, Julie Phillips, Regina Pauly	Cultural Responsiveness the Fun Way Our interactive presentation presents a series of activities which help one learn and experience the wide variety of cultures, life styles, and their intersectionalities. These exercises are designed to build awareness, knowledge, understanding and empathy. The activities are: Step Forward, Step Back, BINGO related to cultural knowledge, The Harvard Implicit Bias inventory, Cards, Dr. Kunjufu's quiz on knowledge of African-American culture, DIE Model, I am. After the activities and the debriefings, we bring it all together with a time for introspection, reflection and, as much as each person is comfortable, sharing with the group. It ends with each person stating two things they will intentionally think about when meeting with advisees.

Platteville East	Factors to Consider in an Environment of Constant Change
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Danielle Stertz, Ariel Powers- Schaub	In Higher Education, we experience changes that redefine our roles, organizational structures, professional relationships, and our relationships with our students. As advisors, we face challenges navigating this land-scape with the expectation that we maintain a high quality of service and ultimately retain our students. When the University of Wisconsin (UW) Flexible Option launched an online competency-based degree in Business Administration, this exciting change brought a number of challenges to student services. Two challenges we faced included a lack of a reliable degree-audit tool, and changing academic policies after the launch of the program. Participants will review case studies based on these challenges. In large-group discussion, they will explore factors to consider and potential solutions if faced with similar challenges at their institution.
Platteville West	Early Alert: Stop Student Drifting!
Kristen Jasperson, Jon Dyess	Students who fall behind in the early weeks of a semester are more likely to drop, fail, or withdraw (DFW) from courses, which may lead to increased DFW rates and decreased retention rates. Academic Student Support Intervention of Success and Transition (ASSIST) is an early alert tool used by faculty and instructional staff to inform academic advisors about struggling students who may need additional academic support. Faculty identify students with poor class performance or low attendance and send an ASSIST alert to the student's academic advisor. The academic advisor reaches out to the student via email or phone call to provide information about support services. Two academic advisors from the University of Wisconsin-Superior will discuss how the ASSIST system operates, outcomes and pitfalls of the ASSIST system, and possible improvements.
University North	Saving Sinking Sophomores
Monica Rausch Camacho, Jaemi Cummins, Alejandra Lopez, Rachel Carr	Many institutions spend time and resources helping their freshmen acclimate to college life and feel connected to their campus to boost retention between freshman and sophomore year. Once these students become sophomores, however, they are in danger of entering a "sophomore slump"—they feel less connected to campus, less engaged with instructors, and more unsure of their major. At the same time, their classes are getting increasingly difficult and they need to hit milestones to continue progress toward their degree. The advisors at UWM's Lubar School of Business conducted focus groups and research to identify what causes this sophomore slump among their student population, and they developed a program to address it. Find out how you can save your sinking sophomores and put an end to the sophomore slump.
University South	Embracing 360 Advising to Enhance Student Success
Angela Kellogg	One of the UW System-level priorities in the 2020FWD strategic framework is 360 Advising, a holistic approach to surrounding students with the support they need to succeed in college and beyond. In this session, we will discuss initiatives to promote excellence in advising in the UW System including strategies to leverage predictive analytics, reduce time to degree, and close opportunity gaps. Through these efforts, we can not only help students drift less, but also increase student retention and completion while empowering students to achieve their educational and career goals. Platteville East	Collaborative Advising of International Students: Challenges and Best Practices

Advisors who work with International students can better assist this population throughout their academic careers by working collaboratively with other campus professionals. Our presentation will review the best practices developed between the Undergraduate Academic Advisors and the International Advisors at UW-Milwaukee to present a united front when working with and conveying information to our International students. We will begin with a brief overview of the immigration requirements for International students. We will then provide examples of some of the common challenges in advising International Students. Finally, we will review the importance of a close relationship between Academic Advising and International Advising for best serving our international students.
